

Deforestation

Trees are cut down to create fields for farming cattle and growing crops, to produce timber & wood pulp to make furniture & paper and to create space for housing. This creates jobs and raises money for local people however, animals and plants may become extinct through habitat loss.



Trees can grow up to 70m tall with huge leafy crowns to catch lots of sunlight. It is cold and windy.

Tress form a dense leafy roof over the plants below and are about 40m tall. Lots of sunlight and plenty of rain. This is the most popular place to live in the rainforest.

Full of leafy bushes and short trees (less than 4m tall) entwined with vines. It has very little sunlight but is warm and humid. Many animals are nocturnal.

Lack of sunlight means very few plants. The forest floor is covered in dead leaves and debris which decompose quickly.

Where in the World?

Rainforests are found near the equator between the tropic of Cancer and the tropic of Capricorn. The equator is humid, there is lots of rain and the sunlight is directly overhead.

Rainforests are located in countries including Brazil, India, Peru, Mexico, Australia and Malaysia.

The Amazon rainforest is the largest tropical rainforest in the world. Located in the continent of South America and spreads across nine countries. It is home to 2.5 million insect species, 40,000+ plant species, 2,000+ species of birds and mammals and 250,000 native tribes.
